

2023 Legislative Session Weekly Report CleanTech Alliance March 5, 2023

Week Eight

The legislature has now passed the half-way point of the 105-day session 2023 legislation session. This week, legislators have devoted almost all of their time to debating bills on the floor. The deadline for passing bills out of their chamber of origin (House or Senate), is Wednesday, March 8th. This week there were several floor debates that went late into the evening and even into the early hours of the morning. Throughout this part of the legislative process, some bills will die because they are simply not one of the majority party's priorities or they lack adequate votes to bring to the floor. Other bills that are indeed majority caucus priorities will die on the floor calendar because the bills get weighed down with time-consuming amendments. As we approach the March 8th house of origin cut off, other bills will fail to advance because of the lack of time and too many bills moving through the process.

Housing issues continue to be front and center with several bills moving through the process this week. The Senate passed <u>SB 5466</u> (Liias, D-21) which would encourage transit oriented development. The Senate also passed <u>SB 5235</u> (Shewmake, D-42) that requires cities and counties to allow for ADUs. The House passed <u>HB 1337</u> (Gregerson, D-33) that would allow for the construction of ADUs in urban growth areas. The House also passed <u>HB 1474</u> (Taylor, D-30) which creates the Covenant Homeownership Account to assist individuals that were affected by racially restrictive covenants with first-time home purchasing costs.

Environmental issues have been on the agenda for majority Democrats this week as well. The House passed HB 1085 (Mena, D-29) this week, which seeks to address plastics use by eventually prohibiting hotels from providing small plastic bottles of soap and shampoo, requiring new construction that provides a drinking fountain to provide water bottle refill stations, and prohibiting the sale of expanded or extruded plastic foam overwater structures. Another Rep. Mena bill, HB 1047 passed this week as well. The legislation bans formaldehyde and formaldehyde releasers, PFAS, lead, phthalates, and other chemicals in cosmetics and personal care products by 2025. The Senate passed SB 5447 (Billig, D-3) this week, a bill that among other elements, proposes a B&O and public utilities tax credit for sales and purchases of alternative jet fuel upon notification of a production facility operating in Washington. Governor's request legislation HB 1216 (Fitzgibbon, D-34) passed out of the House on Saturday, March 4th. This legislation seeks to create an Interagency Clean Energy Siting Coordinating Council to be co-chaired by the Department of Ecology and the Department of Commerce.

Labor and workforce issues came into play this week with the passage of <u>SB 5550</u>. Among other items, the bill requires Washington State Ferries to adopt a formal DEI strategy and allows WSF employees to gain maritime credentials and pilotage on the job. After a lengthy debate and a number of proposed amendments, the Senate also passed <u>SB 5217</u> (Dhingra, D-45), the bill to reinstate L&I's ability to regulate ergonomics. The House passed <u>HB 1106</u> (Fosse, D-38) which seeks to extend unemployment insurance to employees who quit their job for good cause, including parental lack of access to child care or inability to find care for a vulnerable family member.

Late on Friday night, the Senate debated <u>SSB 5536</u> (Robinson, D-38) the legislation addressing the Blake Decision. This is one of the most highly anticipated floor debates as reflected by the final vote of 28-21 with 15 democrats voting no on final passage. The bill as it passed the Senate would amend the current drug possession laws by increasing the penalty for possession of a controlled substance to a gross misdemeanor while creating a pretrial diversion program for individuals that complete substance use disorder treatment. <u>Click here</u> to watch the debate.

On Friday <u>DOH announced</u> that effective April 3rd healthcare, long-term care, and adult correctional facilities will no longer be required to wear masks. A similar announcement was also made on the same day by the state or Oregon.

On March 20th the Washington State Economic & Revenue Forecast Council will release its revenue forecast that legislators will use to draft their 2023-25 Biennium Operating, Transportation and Capital Budgets. A <u>preliminary report</u> is available online. Revenue collections since the November forecast are \$89 million (1.1%) above expectations. The report shows that Washington's unemployment rate has increased for a third consecutive month in December. Wages and salaries were lower than expected and housing construction continued to slow in the fourth quarter of 2022 and early 2023.

Following Wednesday's cutoff legislators will head back to committees where the Senate will hear House bills and the House will hear Senate bills. The House will release their budget after the March 20th revenue forecast and the Senate will release their version soon after. Then budget negotiations will begin. Important dates included below.

<u>HB 1589</u> - Supporting Washington's clean energy economy and transitioning to a clean, affordable, and reliable energy future

This companion legislation, sponsored by Representative Doglio and Senator Nguyen, is an incentive to reduce climate impacts by switching from fossil fuel-based heating equipment to high-efficiency nonemitting equipment. This bill intends to adopt requirements for large combination utilities to conduct integrated system planning to develop specific actions supporting gas system decarbonization and electrification. This bill prohibits gas companies serving more than 500,000 retail natural gas customers in Washington from extending gas service after June 30, 2023 along with a myriad of other directives for utilities. This week, Representative Doglio held another 2-hour meeting with stakeholders and Representative Ybarra. At the end of the meeting, Representative Doglio voiced recognition that this bill has a lot more work that needs to be done. However, she stated her desire is to move it through the legislative process. The bill was pulled from Rules and placed on second reading following the stakeholder discussion.

HB 1584 - Planning for advanced nuclear reactor technology in Washington

This legislation, sponsored by Representative Barnard, works to include the consideration of developing advanced nuclear reactor technology as a cleaner energy source as a guiding principle for the development of the State Energy Strategy. On February 28th, the bill was pulled from Rules and onto the House Floor for deliberation. <u>ESHB</u> 1584 was voted off the floor (91-6) and moves to the Senate for further consideration.

SB 5447 -Promoting the alternative jet fuel industry in Washington.

This legislation, Senator Billig in the Senate, is the legislation that works to incentivize the production of sustainable aviation fuel. The bill moves forward through the legislative process after a near unanimous (46-2) vote on March 1st. It has been scheduled for a public hearing in front of the House Committee on Environment and Energy on March 9th at 8:30 AM.

HB 1216 - Concerning clean energy siting

This Governor request legislation would create an Interagency Clean Energy Siting Coordinating Council to be cochaired by the Department of Ecology and the Department of Commerce. The purpose of the council would be to expedite the permitting for clean energy projects. The bill would also establish a definition for clean energy projects "of statewide significance" and require SEPA review to be completed within two years. The House vehicle of this legislation, sponsored by Representative Fitzgibbon, is the version that continues to move through the process this session. On Saturday, March 4th, the bill moved out of the House with a vote of 75-20. It moves to the Senate for further consideration.

<u>HB 1756</u> - Supporting clean energy through tax changes that increase revenue to local governments, schools, and impacted communities

This legislation, sponsored by Representative Ramel, provides a property tax exemption from the state property tax levy for personal property used for the generation of renewable energy, imposes a production excise tax on the nameplate capacity of qualified renewable energy generating systems, and creates the renewable energy local benefit account. Due to this bill being related to the budget, it is not impacted by cutoff like policy bills are. The bill has been rescheduled for executive session from March 3rd to March 9th in front of the House Committee on Finance at 1:30 PM.

HB 1192 / SB 5165 - Concerning electric power system transmission planning

Office of the Governor request companion legislation, sponsored by Representative Duerr and Senator Nguyen, remain alive post house of origin policy cutoff. The House continues to sit in Rules for further consideration. The Senate vehicle of this legislation was passed of the floor with a vote of 36-13. The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Environment and Energy where it awaits being scheduled for a public hearing.

<u>HB 1170/SB 5093</u> - Improving climate resilience through updates to the state's integrated climate response strategy

This agency requested legislation, sponsored by Representative Street, requires DOE to update the Integrated Climate Change Response Strategy by July 2024 and every 4 years after. Both vehicles of this legislation passed through fiscal committees before the cutoff and now sit in Rules awaiting further consideration.

Continue to Monitor for Movement:

<u>SB 5091</u> - Creating and expanding tax incentives for the research, development, production, and sale of hydrogen fuel cells in Washington state

This legislation, sponsored by Senator King, would authorize state business and occupation (B&O) tax incentives for businesses engaged in activities related to hydrogen fuel cell research, development, production, and sale. The bill did not get a public hearing in its fiscal committee and looks unlikely to move forward this legislative session. Unless deemed necessary to implement the budget, this bill is dead this session.
