

2024 Legislative Session Weekly Report CleanTech Alliance February 4, 2024

Week Four

We are currently finishing the fourth week of the legislative session, with five weeks remaining. On Wednesday, January 31st, we reached the deadline for bills to pass out of their policy committees in order to remain alive. Attention in Olympia has moved to fiscal committees as we head to the next key date - the House of Origin Fiscal Committee cutoff - which is on Monday, February 5th. Fiscal committees are working over the weekend to hold public hearings and executive action sessions on bills prior to Monday's deadline. Following the fiscal cutoff, both chambers will head to the floor to pass bills out of their respective chambers until the House of Origin cutoff on February 13th. This week also marked the deadline for legislators to submit their requests for the supplemental Transportation and Operating budgets. Budget chairs are currently compiling all of the requests and trying to figure out what will fit in their budget. We anticipate that House and Senate budget proposals will be released in the next two weeks and then negotiations between the House and Senate will begin.

Key Issues Before the Legislature - Week 4:

- Executive Order on AI Governor Jay Inslee signed an executive order for the development of guidelines on the ethical and transparent adoption of generative artificial intelligence (AI) in Washington state's operations. This initiative, led by WaTech in collaboration with the governor's cabinet agencies, aims to evaluate the feasibility and potential of generative AI projects in state functions, establishing procurement, usage, and monitoring guidelines. The order emphasizes the importance of assessing the technology's impact on vulnerable communities and the state workforce, promoting equitable and responsible AI use. This move aligns Washington with other states proactive in regulating AI, positioning it as a leader in addressing the challenges and opportunities presented by generative AI technology. - **Converting Commercial Offices into Housing -** <u>HB 2308</u> and <u>SB 6175</u> seek to offer financial incentives for developers to convert commercial buildings into residential units, aiming to address the urgent need for housing. These proposals, supported by local officials, include property tax exemptions and potential exemptions from mandatory housing affordability requirements, with the goal of spurring the creation of affordable housing and revitalizing downtown areas. Both vehicles of this legislation are alive following the House of Origin Policy cutoff. Read more <u>here</u>.
- **Bottle Deposit Bill** HB 2144, a bill that intends to create a bottle deposit system similar to Oregon and California models, had a <u>public hearing</u> in House Finance on Thursday. Proponents of the legislation claim that this will create a better circular economy of recycling and opponents claim that there is already a circular economy for these products and the bill is tax on the poor. The bill is scheduled for executive session on <u>Monday</u>, <u>February 5th</u>.
- **Oil Transparency** <u>SB 6052</u> is aimed at increasing transparency from big oil companies and is part of Governor Inslee's climate initiatives. The bill proposes creating a Petroleum Market Oversight division

within the UTC to monitor and report on oil companies' margins and pricing. Supporters argue it will aid the state's transition from fossil fuels and provide insights into petroleum market dynamics and opponents worry about the costs and cybersecurity risks associated with the new regulatory entity. The bill made it through cutoff and is scheduled for a <u>public hearing</u> on Saturday, February 3rd in front of Senate Ways & Means. Read more here.

- **Limiting Natural Gas to Decarbonize Energy Grid** <u>HB 1589</u> aims to decarbonize Washington State's energy grid by limiting the expansion of natural gas services. Insight - Week 4:

- **Initiatives Update:** All six initiatives were certified by the Secretary of State's office. Initiatives are exempt from cutoff dates.
 - I-2117 would repeal the two-year-old Climate Commitment Act, which imposes annual limits on greenhouse gas emissions for major emitters and requires them to buy allowances at state auctions for each metric ton of their pollution. Last year, these auctions generated \$1.8 billion, earmarked for renewable energy initiatives. Critics argue that the act leads to increased prices for fuel, food, and energy, claiming that businesses are transferring these additional costs to the consumers.
 - o <u>I-2109</u> would repeal the capital gains excise tax imposed on sales and exchanges of long-term capital assets by individuals with capital gains over \$250,000.
 - o <u>I-2113</u> would restore vehicular pursuit laws.
 - o <u>I-2081</u> would establish a parents' bill of rights.
 - <u>I-2111</u> would codify Washington state's longstanding tradition of prohibiting state and local personal income taxes.
 - o <u>I-2124</u> enables working individuals to choose not to participate in the Washington Cares Fund.

CleanTech Alliance Specifics

We had the CTA Advocacy Day this week; thank you to all the participants who came down to Olympia. In partnership with Helion and Microsoft, we also hosted a dinner with key legislative leaders. We had extensive conversations on fusion and supply line issues this week.

Bills that Survived Cutoff:

- Representative Barnard has introduced legislation aimed at establishing the development of renewable energy for the Washington revolving loan program and account (<u>HB 2417</u>). The bill was heard in the House Capital Budget Committee on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>February 1st</u>.
- The Senate version of the carbon market linkage bill (<u>SB 6058</u>) was heard in the Senate Ways & Means Committee on <u>Friday, January 2nd</u>. The House version (<u>HB 2201</u>) was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on <u>Friday</u> well, and is scheduled for executive session on <u>Monday</u>, <u>February 5th</u>.
- Senator Shewmake's <u>SB 6092</u> (concerning disclosure of greenhouse gas emissions) received a do pass recommendation in the Senate Environment, Energy & Technology Committee on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 30th</u> and was heard in the Senate Ways & Means Committee on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>February 3rd</u>.

- Representative Ramel's thermal energy networks bill for gas utilities (<u>HB 2131</u>) was heard in the House Capital Budget Committee on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>February 1st</u> and received a do pass recommendation on <u>Friday</u>, <u>February 2nd</u>. The Senate version (<u>SB 6138</u>) has yet to advance beyond its initial hearing on <u>January 24th</u>.
- Representative Slatter's bill (<u>HB 2073</u>) regarding greenhouse gasses from sources other than methane and carbon dioxide was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on <u>Thursday, February 1st</u> and received a do pass recommendation on <u>Saturday, February 3rd</u>.
- This week, <u>HB 2049</u> (Re-WRAP Act) was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>February 1st</u>. The Committee took executive action on the bill <u>Saturday</u>, <u>February 3rd</u>. The bill passed out of Appropriations 18-11, all of the Rs voted against the bill along with Rep. Tharinger (D-Port Townsend). The Committee adopted a striking <u>amendment</u> from Rep. Fitzgibbon and one <u>additional amendment</u> from Rep. Stonier. The Senate version of the bill <u>SB 6005</u> did not move out of committee, which means the Senate is going to wait for the House bill to come over. The bill will face stiff resistance on the floor.
- We continue to monitor <u>HB 2401</u> (providing for the responsible management of refrigerant gasses with a higher global warming potential than carbon dioxide that are used in appliances or other infrastructure), which passed out of the House Environment & Energy Committee in its <u>substitute form</u> on <u>Monday, January 29th</u>. It was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on <u>Saturday, February 3rd</u>, and is scheduled for executive session on <u>Monday</u>, <u>February 5th</u>.
- Rep. Doglio's bill, <u>HB 1589</u>, works to support Washington's clean energy economy and transitioning to a clean, affordable, and reliable energy future. It moved out of the House last week and had a public hearing in the Senate Environment, Energy & Technology Committee on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>January 31st</u>. Negotiations between the proponents and opponents continue and it is anticipated that it will be scheduled for executive session with amendment language on the bar.
- <u>HB 2020</u>, sponsored by Representative Timmons, authorizes the Military Department to administer a program for emergency assistance to county governments and federally recognized tribes that experience public infrastructure damage due to a natural, technological, or human-caused disaster. This bill was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>February 1st</u>, and received a do pass recommendation during executive session on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>February 3rd</u>.
- <u>HB 2069</u>, concerning the sale of biogenic carbon dioxide and other coproducts of biogas processing. Introduced by Representative Mosbrucker, the bill was passed out of the House Environment & Energy Committee on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 30th</u> in its <u>substitute form</u>, continues to sit in House Rules.

Bills that Appear Dead:

 Senator Mullet introduced legislation to provide a state B&O tax exemption to encourage clean technology manufacturing in Washington (<u>SB 6243</u>). It did not move out of its house of origin policy committee prior to the cutoff.
